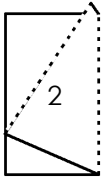


# KING KITE

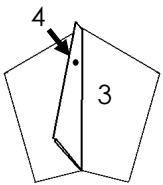
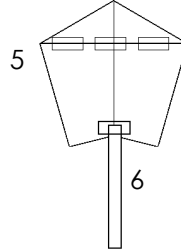
You'll need: 9 1/2" bamboo skewer, paper punch, tape, markers, and a ball of string.

You'll also need a 3'X1" plastic strip for the kite tail. (The handle from a pull-tie garbage bag works well. Or you can cut a 3' by 1" strip from a garbage bag.)

\*If you want to design your own kite, decorate the back of this page. After you finish step 4, refold the center so the instructions are inside of the "nose" and the king's face is the back of the kite.



1. Fold back on the center dotted line to fold in half.
2. Fold up the angled dashed line on each side.
3. Open, and fold them flat.
4. Use a paper punch to punch the hole.
5. Flip the kite to the blank side. Tape the bamboo skewer from top left corner to top right corner.
6. Tape the plastic strip (tail) to bottom of the kite.



You can actually fly this kite!

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
